Concurrent Assessment

Concurrent assessment (Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)) is necessary to make students aware of their performance and progress in learning. It should be conducted over the period of the course taught to them.

Teaching and learning are fully connected and are seamlessly intertwined. Both involve teachers and students in the entire process from teaching learning to evaluation. In order to know their own position in teaching and learning, teachers can deploy different methods of assessment. The continuous assessment allows teachers to understand their efficacy of teaching methods and learners to understand their progress in that specific course. The continuous assessment, therefore, is a kind of feedback on the process of teaching learning.

The college has put in place the idea of sharing the assessment with students. Furthermore the feedback by way of assessment is used for further improvement. Different methods of teaching and assessment are used by the teachers and they exercise full freedom to design various ways to assess the performance of the students at any stage of the course in the semester. It is the policy of the college that the teachers are required to check the knowledge of the subject matter, the presentation of information, critical thinking and communicational dimensions of the course. Generally the teachers are required to conduct the assessment on almost all the modules of each course taught in the semester. The tests carry 20 marks and the presentations are used to share the immediate feedback on the essential skills in the profession.

Methods and Rules of Evaluation:

1. Class Tests:

- The tests are conducted in relation with the holistic rubric.
- Each test is of twenty marks.
- Generally tests are on one or two modules at a time.
- The tests are of descriptive nature.
- The writing skills of the students are examined.

2. MCQs:

- The MCQs are also either on one or two modules.
- There will be twenty questions and each question carries one mark.
- This kind of test is held to test the knowledge of the subject matter

3. Group Discussion:



- The sessions of group discussion are held to develop various skills of the students.
- Small groups are made and the students are given different topics as well.
- The teachers monitor the group discussion and provide immediate feedback to the students on their weak areas.

4. Case Law Analysis

- The students are given prominent case laws.
- The students in the groups are required to contribute to the analytical assessment.

5. Presentations

- The students are required to make presentations on various topics.
- A number of the students make presentations on each module.
- The method of assessment is conducted to their presentation skill.
- The communication skills are also strengthened.

6. Class Assignment:

- Generally this kind of assignment is given to a few students at a time as per the progress in teaching the course.
- The students are required to write such class assignments in their notebooks.
- The assignments are marked with the remarks such as excellent, very good, good and the other.

7. Mid term Internal Assessment:

- Mid term assessment of each course is of twenty marks.
- The students can write any five questions.
- The teachers display the marks so that the students can know their position in the test.
- If it is necessary, the students can write the assessment again.

8. Moot Court Presentation:

- The students of the final year of both the programmes, BALLB and LLB are required to make moot court presentations.
- The moot court activities are also conducted for other classes.
- The moots are necessary to develop and strengthen argumentative, presentation and communication skills.
- These moots are meant to provide the students with practical inputs of the legal profession.
- The moots are important to develop the research skills of the students.

9. Role Play

- The method of the assessment is also used in the classes.
- The role play is meant to strengthen the conversational skills.
- It is also used to prepare students to speak spontaneously and to boost their confidence.

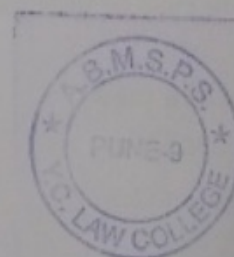

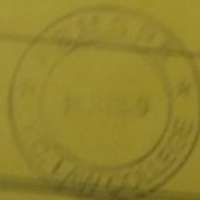

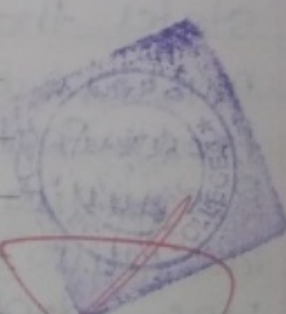

→ The judiciary always refers to certain principles, doctrines and precedents to pronounce judgment in any suit. It plays an immense role in any suit. It makes the judiciary work efficiently and pace the speed of delivering judgement.

In our country, the litigation process is very time consuming and expensive due to the large number of cases filed everyday. Hence, there are two doctrines, i.e. res judicata and res sub-judice, under the Code of Civil procedure, 1908, which aims to provide efficiency and speedy process during proceedings.

Res judicata:-

Res means a subject matter, and judicato means adjudged. The doctrine of res judicata is adopted from 'res judicata pro vericata accipitur' which states that once the decision has been made, it must be accepted as true and final. It developed from English common law.

Res judicata was initially adopted from common law into the Code of Civil Procedure, and later it was adopted into the Indian legal system.

The doctrine of res judicata is based on certain maxims, which are the following:

1) Introduction:-

In 1969 fourteen major commercial banks were nationalised in India. Foreign banks & other banks with deposits of less than 50 crores were not nationalized. Six more commercial banks were nationalized in 1980. The nationalized commercial banks were at that time controlling 91% of total deposits & total credit. Nationalization of commercial banks in India is looked as a significant effort of government of India to strengthen the economy.

2) Arguments in favour of nationalization of banks in India.

Various factors were responsible for the nationalization of commercial banks in India. A discussion on these factors that helped in this, are as follows

i) Too much concentration in the banking sector - In 1954 there were 570 banks in India but in 1963 the number came down to 276. However during this period amount of bank deposits had increased more than two times. This shows too much concentration in banking sector. Again, out of 276 banks just 5 banks contributed to more than 50% of the deposits. The big industrialists used the banks, funds to build up their industrial empires. This implies the

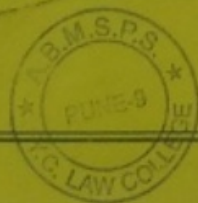

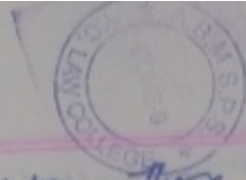

to carry out as welfare state. These duties include provision for an infrastructure network and public services such as schools, hospitals, parks etc, as well as a redistribution of wealth to less affluent income groups. The intention of public land acquisition is to reduce the hassles in obtaining the land for these government services.

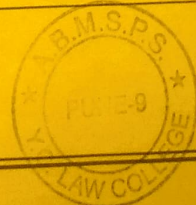

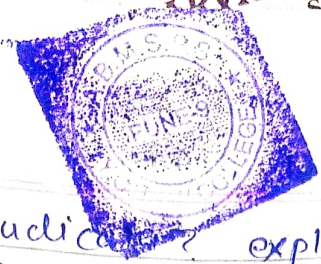

What is 'Res judicata'? explain the doctrine by differentiating it with the doctrine of Res Sub-judice & estoppel.

Section 11 of the code of civil procedure embodies the doctrine of res-judicata or the rule of conclusiveness of a judgement, so to the points decided either of fact, or of law or of fact & law in every subsequent suit between the same parties, it enacts that once a matter is finally decided by a competent court, no party can be permitted to reopen it in a subsequent litigation. In the absence of such a rule there will be no end to litigation & the parties would be put to constant trouble, harassment & expense.

This doctrine has been accepted in all civilized legal systems. Under the Roman law, a defendant could successfully contest a suit filed by a plaintiff on the plea of 'in ex captio' res-judicata. It was said 'one suit and one decision is enough for only single dispute. In the words of Spencer Bower res-judicata means 'a final judicial decision pronounced by a judicial tribunal having competent jurisdiction over the cause or matter in litigation & over the parties thereto.

Section 11 :-

Section 11 of the code of civil procedure reads thus
No court shall try any suit or issue in which the matter directly & substantially in former suit between the same parties or between parties and/or whom they or any of them claim, litigants under

The same title, in a court competent to try such subsequent suit on the suit in which such issue has been subsequently raised & has been heard in the suit finally decided by such court.

Explanation I :- The expression, former suit shall denote a suit which has been decided prior to the suit in question whether or not it was instituted prior thereto.

Explanation II :- The matter above referred to must in the former suit have been alleged by one party & either denied or admitted, expressly or impliedly by the other.

Explanation III :- The matter above referred to must in the former suit have been alleged by one party & either denied or pleaded as to a right of appeal from the decision of such court.

Explanation IV :- Any matter which might & ought have been made ground of defence or attack in such former suit shall be deemed to have been a matter directly & subsequently in issue in such suit.

Explanation V :- Any relief claimed in the plaint, which is not expressly granted by the decree, shall for the purposes of this section, be deemed to have been refused.

Explanation VI :- Where persons who are bona fide
